

Remembering Marvin Meyers

JULY 21, 1934 - NOVEMBER 19, 2019



Marvin Meyers was a dear friend to Fresno County students.

We lost our friend Marvin Meyers last November, but we think of him often. We honor him as one of the founding members of The Foundation @ FCOE Board of Directors and the 2013 FCOE Honors Agriculture recipient. Marvin believed agricultural education prepares students for successful careers in the science, business, and technology of plant and animal production, and the environmental and natural resources systems. He played a key role in building a bridge between schools, students, teachers, the business community – and agriculture.

Marvin was a pioneering water conservationist and in 1998, he established the Meyers Water Bank and Wildlife Project, an innovative water-banking system that draws an array of wildlife. The Project has developed into an educational program for children of all ages to come and learn about the importance of water and wildlife to the Central Valley. Marvin generously funded school field trips for Fresno County schools that focus on native plant and wetland restoration. He also provided funding for the docent program organized by the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools, Scout Island Educational Center.

Students had a special place in Marvin's heart and he valued investing in their educational success by contributing to the Career Technical Education Charter High School (CTEC). CTEC is a state-of-the-art dual enrollment charter high school operated by the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools. CTEC combines core academics with real-world application in the industries of commercial construction and manufacturing while earning college credit. His imprint on CTEC cherished far into the future with the 2018 dedication of the Innovation Center honoring Marvin and Tish Meyers for their unwavering support of Fresno County students.

He loved and valued his community and the people of the Central Valley where he was generous with his time, talent and educational investments. Marvin owned and operated Meyers Farming I-IV, Oxford Farms, Inc., and Meyers Farm Family Trust for more than thirty years and his community and charitable involvement was extensive. He was a Mason, and he loved Fresno State donating the Meyers Family Sports Medicine Center and starting the Agricultural Livestock Judging Team. He was also proud of his participation in the Valley Children's survivorship program. Marvin had the honor of being recognized with many awards over his lifetime including the 2010 Chamber of Commerce Agriculturist of the year and the 2012 Top Dog Fresno State Alumni Award. He served as President of the San Luis Water District and was appointed by Governor Schwarzenegger to serve on the Governor's Agriculture Advisory Commission.

His legacy was leaving the world a better place, particularly at the nexus of education and agriculture. In Marvin's honor, The Foundation @ FCOE established the Marvin Meyers Agriculture Education Fund to support Fresno County schools with agriculture education beginning the 2021-2022 school year. He is greatly missed by everyone that had the pleasure to know him, but his memory will live on in Fresno and the greater Central Valley.
